Without this massive contribution we would not be able to achieve what we currently do on behalf of the older people and carers in rural West Cheshire.

#### **Meet One Of Our Breaktime Volunteers**

'Everybody needs somebody and by helping them it helps me too.'

This is what Joan says about what being a volunteer means to her. Joan was a client of our Breaktime service before she became a volunteer. Here is her story.

Joan is a widow, now 81 years of age. She lost her husband, Frank, six years ago.

Joan became aware of OPAL when we took over the Age Concern day centres, as her late mother Freda was a member. Freda then became a member at the Kelsall OPAL club. She was a little reluctant at first but took to it 'like a duck to water'. She was always disappointed when it was a bank holiday Monday, as this meant the club was closed.

As Joan was a carer to her mother she become a Breaktime client; the very first, in fact. Breaktime gave Joan peace of mind knowing, that her mother was safe with a volunteer, and allowing her to have a break.

Freda passed away in 2015 at the age of 97. Joan still maintained her links with OPAL and often supported the fundraisers and coffee mornings that Zoe held at the Methodist Church. But she found herself in a new situation following Freda's death, and felt that she was becoming lonely and very isolated.



She had a number of good friends one of whom was Jane Colville, our Chair, and from Jane she learnt more about OPAL and the possibility of becoming a volunteer with the Kelsall club.

Joan said she thought long and hard about this but decided that rather than being a Club volunteer she felt she had more to offer by being a Breaktime volunteer. Jean Toyn invited Joan to the Breaktime Christmas Event in 2015 and Joan's not stopped since. She officially became a Breaktime volunteer in February 2016.

She spends on average two hours a week volunteering for a lady called Betty in Dunham Hill, and if this wasn't fate we don't know what is: Betty and Joan grew up in the same village, Ashton Hayes. Joan even went to school with Betty's husband John. They both went to Normain College and used to cycle together in the mornings to get there. She and Betty regularly went to dances together when they were younger too.

Breaktime brought them back together. Sadly, Betty suffers with Alzheimer's, is quite deaf and has macular problems, but the time goes by so quickly when Joan and Betty get together. They chat and laugh about most things, especially about the village they both grew up in and the neighbours they knew.

Joan said that she looks forward in seeing Betty and John, she feels better in herself and less lonely.

Joan is also a client with Go On Line and often attends the Kelsall venue for help and support with her iPad. She says that she is still trying to master it but is more confident with it now and gains knowledge all the time by attending the sessions. She thinks all of the volunteers are very good and patient.
