## WEATHERING THE STORMS...

As a nation, we do enjoy talking about the weather and this year has definitely given us something to talk about. It has been 40 days since St Swithin's Day, and whether it rained on 15th July or not, the prophecy has NEVER come true!

Weather folklore, according to Country Life, is a snapshot of a distant past when a general sense of what was in store was good enough. Country Life say that the folklore of "red sky at night, brings shepherd's delight" is far more reliable. This is caused by high pressure, which brings in the better weather, traps dust and dirt, dispersing blue light, and gives the sky a distinctive rosy hue.





Other popular weather predictors are less accurate. A pine cone is a good indicator of dry weather. Dry when open, and damp when closed but apparently the notion of cows lying down in a field as a sign of impending rain is misguided - they have to lie down at some point!

Whilst weather forecasting is still mixed, the world is benefitting from more accurate recording and 2020 has broken some records. The Spring of 2020 was the sunniest since 1929, and this followed the wettest February ever recorded. And before the storms of last week, the South of England had recorded its longest stretch of temperatures exceeding 34C since records began in the 1960s. But the weather in Cheshire is forever changing so we recommend an umbrella, sun hat, woolly coat and, of course, face mask if you are venturing out at the moment!
