PANCAKES!

Tuesday 16th February is Shrove Tuesday, the day before Lent starts and it is believed that the word *shrove* comes from the old middle English word 'Shriven' meaning to go to confession to say sorry for the wrong things you've done. Christians would go to confession the day before Ash Wednesday, and this became known as Shrove Tuesday.

It is now also known as Pancake Day, and the story for this apparently dates back to 1445 when a harassed housewife in Olney Buckinghamshire, hearing the shriving bell, dashing to the Church still clutching her frying pan containing a pancake! This led to village pancake races, now a yearly tradition following the revival of the custom in 1948. (Olney pancake race website). Mardis Gras (Fat Tuesday in French) are festivals celebrated around the world on Shrove Tuesday.

It was very sad to hear of the passing of Captain Sir Tom Moore. He was a much needed ray of sunshine last year when the NHS and the nation needed a boost. He will be remembered for his amazing fundraising and his positive outlook on life. "The sun will shine on you again, and the clouds will go away".

This is Your Life.....

CARMEN MIRANDA

Birthplace

Carmen Miranda was born Maria do Carmo Miranda da Cunha on February 9, 1909, near Porto, Portugal. Her father named her after the Bizet opera. Not long after her birth her family moved to Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, for her father's business.

Before she was famous

After leaving school, Carmen got a job at a local store and often sang whilst she worked, and before long she was discovered and ultimately got a recording contract with RCA. By 1928 she was a genuine superstar in Brazil. She made her debut on screen in 1933 and continued to churn out hit songs until 1939 when she was taken to New York.

Career

In the late 1930s, she started capturing the Americans' hearts even though she could speak no English, but her singing, dancing and rolling her eyes were quick to capture people's imagination! She began on Broadway, making a big impression with her trademark Tutti Frutti hat and wide grin, and moved into movies starring alongside Hollywood stars like Betty Grable.

Personal life

She was married to film producer David Sebastian for 8 years, until her sudden death from a heart attack in 1947.
