This week Simon from Carers Connect gives OPAL his tips on Vertical Gardening



THIS MONTH IN HISTOR

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If you only have a small garden or you are short on space for growing vegetables then why not try growing vertically or upwards? All you need are some bamboo canes or you could build a framework structure using 2 x1 inch treated wood with a wire cage attached or both, as I have done (left) with the help of my good friend Alec, who is 86 years young! I am going to grow cucurbits - squashes, cucumbers, courgettes and melons, plus

sweet corn and legumes, runner beans, french beans and peas at the front and also up the canes, plus some tomatoes at the sides.

If you haven't got any canes you could always try the three sisters method of growing squashes, sweetcorn and legumes that Native American Red Indians have used for centuries. The "sister beans" deposit nitrogen from the air into the soil, in a form that the plants can use. The "sister corn" provides support for bean vines to climb upon. The "sister squash" shades the ground with it's large leaves to provide a good growing environment for all the sisters. Companion planting at it's best!

With millions more people enjoying the pleasure of plants and gardening over the last year, the RHS wants to inspire everyone to keep growing and enjoying green spaces. This is Your Life...

SIR TOM MOORE

Birth place – Tom Moore was born in Keighley, West Riding of Yorkshire, England, on 30 April 1920. His father was from of a family of builders and his mother was a head teacher.



Education - He was educated at Keighley Grammar School and afterwards started an apprenticeship in civil engineering.

Military service - Sir Tom was conscripted in the 8th Battalion, Duke of Wellington's Regiment (8 DWR) in May 1940. He was promoted to war-substantive lieutenant in 1942 and to temporary captain in 1944. He was demobilised in 1946.

Marriage - He was first married in 1949 to a woman who was known as "Billie". The couple divorced and in January 1968, he married Pamela. They had two daughters, Lucy and Hannah. The couple retired to the Costa del Sol, Spain, but returned when Pamela developed a form of dementia. She spent her last years in a nursing home, where Sir Tom would visit her every day. He then lived with Hannah, her husband, and two grandchildren until his death. He also had two other grandchildren.

Career - After leaving the army at 46 years old, he worked as a sales manager for a roofing materials company in Yorkshire and was later appointed general manager of a company manufacturing concrete pipes. He led a management buyout in 1983, with the assistance of local MP, Clement Freud, who became an investor in the renamed March Concrete Products Ltd.

Hobbies - Sir Tom raced motorcycles competitively – he purchased his first when he was 12 - a Scott motorcycle - winning several trophies. He was a member of the Keighley and District Photographic Association between 1934 and 1936, as his father had also been.

Did you know? Sir Tom held two Guinness World Records: as the fundraiser raising the greatest amount of money in an individual charity walk, and as the oldest person to have a number-one single on the UK charts. He was also a contestant in the Christmas Day 1983 edition of the BBC Television game show Blankety Blank.
