Nature is providing us all with some beautiful colours at the moment. One clever reptile is the chameleon—they are able to adapt their skin tones to their environment producing an array of colours. There are many types of chameleon—the Yemen chameleon come in shades of greens and browns and are easily recognised by their distinctive veil on top of the head which gives them their pet name, veiled chameleon.

Originally from Saudi Arabia, they normally live for around 12 years in captivity. Panther chameleons come in all sorts off colours such as greens, reds, pinks, blues and oranges and are originally from Madagascar. They can grow up to 20cms and only live between 2-5 years in captivity.

Interesting fact—did you know chameleons can swivel their eyes around in two different directions simultaneously?
