





**Older People Active Lives** 

For an interesting local day out why not visit the National Waterways Museum in Ellesmere Port, locally known as the Boat Museum. The town of Ellesmere Port grew up around the never completed Ellesmere Canal. Designed by William Jessop and Thomas Telford, the canal hoped to link the Severn, Mersey and Dee rivers, but it never made it to

the Severn. In the nineteenth century Burnell's Iron Works and the Wolverhampton Corrugated Iron Company settled around the docks, starting the expansion of the town.

Now the original settlement around the Ellesmere Canal on Dock Street is home to the Waterways Museum, which opened 45 years

ago. Supported by a large team, the volunteers lovingly restore boats and artefacts associated with the waterways.

There is lots to see and do including narrowboat trips in conjunction with the Wirral Community Narrowboat Trust. Take a wander around the huge collection of boats which have been carefully restored - many of which you can climb on board. 'Friendship' is one of the stars of the show, a beautiful narrowboat donated to the museum by its owners Joe and Rose Skinner on their retirement. You can hear their life story and what birth, life and death was like for canal folk through the displays. Or why not view 90% of the UK's inland waterways collections including some 15,000 objects and over 50 boats. It is the most comprehensive and important collection of inland waterways material in the United Kingdom, and the largest in the world. Add that to working engines, the world's largest collection of canal crafts and Lock demonstrations and we think you will agree it makes for an interesting and fun filled day out.

## "THE DANNY"

If you drive over the Weaver River regularly, either at Frodsham or Acton Bridge, you may have seen the Daniel Adamson Steamship moored and wondered about its history. It is a unique

> Steam Ship and is listed as 15th on the Register of National Historic Ships.

She was built at Cammell Laird shipyard in Birkenhead in 1903, and originally named the Ralph Brocklebank. She was a small but powerful canal tug and towed barges laden with goods from the inland towns of Cheshire

and the Potteries to the busy seaport of Liverpool.

In 1936, she was chosen as the official director's launch. This led to her having a complete refit and her name was changed to The Daniel Adamson. It was redesigned to echo the great liners of the era, with art deco features and stylish saloons.

She was withdrawn from service in 1984 and went to The Boat Museum in Ellesmere Port. After many years there, a restoration project got under way and by 2016 she was restored to her former glory and available for hire and cruises. The interior was restored with carpets and furnishings handcrafted locally to match the original designs by referring to photographs taken in 1930s. See the website www.thedanny.co.uk

The Irish polar explorer Sir Ernest Shackleton's ship 'Endurance' was originally called 'Aurora'; he changed it to honour his family's motto 'Through endurance we conquer'. But changing the name of a ship was considered bad luck in those days. In 1914 he set off to Antarctica and the 'Endurance' became trapped in ice. He and six men survived in a 24-foot boat and travelled 960 km / 600 miles across the treacherous waters until a Chilean ship rescued them.
